The Digger with the Kangaroo

The story of William Charles Westbury – "The man with the kangaroo"

Aboriginal service in the Boer War and World War I

The Aboriginal Veterans of South Australia or AVSA is a small group of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal veterans and friends.

They look to find out more about Aboriginal men and women who have served our nation in time of war.

As Aboriginal men and women were prevented by legislation from enlisting in World Wars I and II, they often changed their names to imply a different culture. Adopting a European name was often enough to fool the recruiters!

When Aboriginal veterans returned from service, most reclaimed their original identity. Given that the records in the Australian War Memorial for these veterans are under the "assumed" name, the link with individual service was quickly lost.

No wonder that when queried prior to the ANZAC Centenary, many Aboriginal veterans said "ANZAC is a party to which we have never been invited!"

For some 11 years now AVSA has been trying to identify an Aboriginal veteran from SA who served in the Boer War.

Every other state has one or more. We didn't have any!

We had one who *volunteered* to serve. The local Police Sergeant at Melrose gave him a reference – that he was a good shot and that he could ride well. The Police Sergeant opined "The Boers will never get him!"

While this man volunteered, we have no confirmation that he was actually sent to South Africa.

All that changed on 20 April 2017.

Through the hard work of historian Paul Bakker and with the eagle eye of Dogs Kearney and Ian Smith, the story of William Charles Westbury, an extraordinary Aboriginal veteran, was discovered.

Have a look at this for a record of service!



William Charles Westbury

He was born in Mount Gambier in 1878, his mother being of the local Boandik people.

Served for 18 months in the 5th and 6th South Australian Imperial Bushmen at the Boer War.

Upon his return from South Africa he worked at Pinnaroo and enlisted for World War I on 25 August 1914, only four weeks after war was declared!

He joined 10 Bn and landed at Gallipoli on the first ANZAC Day – 25 April 1915 – so he is an original ANZAC!

He was promoted to Cpl on 28 April 1915.

He was wounded at Gallipoli (shot in the foot).

He was evacuated to hospital in the UK for 22 days, returning to Gallipoli on 30 June 1915.

He was evacuated in December 1915 at the conclusion of the campaign.

He joined 50Bn and after training in Egypt he was deployed to the Western Front.

He participated in the Battle of Mouquet Farm

He returned home on 10 May 1917 and was discharged as medically unfit on 27 August 1917.

Post war he enjoyed a marvellous life in the South East – his Aboriginal family came from Port Mc Donnell, so he spent a lot of time there.

He went back to work in Pinnaroo, but kept a link with the coast so he could "scruff a butt of crays."

He kept healthy – was a boxer and a footballer (in spite of having lost three toes as a result of his war wound)

In 1919 (aged 41!) he entered a running race in Pinnaroo – he ran over 3 1/2 miles and won in "scorching Mallee heat."

His family still retain the gold medals he was presented with.

He died in 1936 at age 58 of war injuries and is buried at Pinnaroo

His grave is still cared for.

In 2015 a Pinnaroo Charity Event was held that recreated the 1919 races that he had won.

His descendants were honorary guests.

"A" Company Story Too Good To Lose!

In Killed Company is the story of an Infantry rifle company known to the majority of those who were associated with it simply as 'A Company'. For over fifty years 'A Company' has provided a venue through which citizens of the South East of South Australia have been able to contribute part time military service. *In Killed Company* provides a vivid insight into what it was like to be a member of a South Australian country reserve unit.

However as Major General Neil Wilson suggests in the book's foreword, if the names, places and anecdotes are changed, *In Killed Company* could be the unofficial history of any sub-unit in the Australian Army Reserve.

From the various military organizations that preceded the establishment of 'A Company' as part of 27 Battalion South Australian Scottish Regiment, through the Company's employment as part of the Citizen Military Forces within the Royal South Australia Regiment, to its most recent allocation within the Army Reserve as an element of 10/27 Battalion Royal South Australia Regiment, *In Killed Company* follows the latter-day development of the Company through the eyes of the many individuals who have filled its ranks, signposting significant milestones in the life of 'A Company' and detailing the effects of political and bureaucratic decisions that effected the Company and its members.

I caught up with Max Carmichael at the 2017 Formal Dinner in Adelaide, and we spoke of his book *In Killed Company*. I first purchased the book back in 2011, and Max said he still had some copies available, and in a very generous offer, he said if any member would like a SIGNED copy of the book, all you need to do is pay postage (\$2) and a small donation to Legacy, (\$10 - \$15 is suggested) and the book is yours. The book retailed previously for \$39.95.

Guest Speaker for February Luncheon - Paul "Tich" Tyson OAM



Paul 'Tich' Tyson is a Broken-Hill lad who served in the Army for many years, and continues to serve our veterans as a welfare advocate. In 2016 he was awarded an OAM for his services to veterans and their families. We will hear about his life in Broken Hill, his family's involvement with the Military, and about joining the Army at age 17 where he found himself in the Medical Corps and eventually serving in Vietnam. Tich will recount some of those Vietnam experiences at 1st Australian Field Hospital, call-sign *Vampire*.

When Australia's combat role in Vietnam ended in November 1971 with the withdrawal of most of the 4th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (4RAR) from Nui Dat, most of the medical personnel were withdrawn from 1 Aust FD Hosp. The hospital remained in operation until December that year, when the bulk of Australian ground forces returned to Australia. Tich will talk about those final days in Vietnam, and about his current involvement in the Veteran arena.

10th Bn AIF Association

PURPLE AND BLUE BROTHERS

After each of the World Wars the returning diggers wanted to retain the comradeship and bonds that had been developed in adversity and a common experience. The men also wanted to assist each other in re-establishing themselves in civilian life. To do this they formed Clubs and Associations. This was the reason for the formation of the 10TH Battalion Club after WWI and the 2/10TH Battalion Club after WWII. After WWII the sense of having 2 separate Clubs was questioned and they were amalgamated in 1946 with the members blending well. In fact some members had served in both Battalions. Membership peaked at 1270 in 1955. In 1980 the 50TH Battalion Club was incorporated into the Association, after its' club had wound up. There were some members having served in both the 50TH and the 10TH Battalions, as the 50TH was born from the 10TH in Egypt in 1916, when Battalions were split up to enable the creation of new Divisions. In the 1990's the Association began to welcome new members that had served in the 10TH Battalion RSAR.

Aims & Purposes

The Association was a fellowship and welfare community that was the guardian of the good name of the 10TH, 50TH and 2/10TH Battalions. This was underpinned by the constitutional aims and purposes of the Association:

- To retain the interest of ex-personnel of the constituent battalions;
- To promote the interests of their members and of their dependants;
- To provide an organisation which will assist, in all possible manner, any member who is in need of assistance and advice;
- To perpetuate the memory and traditions of the 10th and 50th Battalions AIF and of the 2/10th Battalion AIF;
- To do all such things as are conducive or incidental to the attainment of all the above objectives or any of them.

These aims and objectives have truly been fulfilled over the years by the members and successive committees of the Association. This was achieved through the welfare program which included hospital visits to ailing Members, financial assistance in times of need, advice and advocacy on veteran's entitlements. Much effort was made over the years to arrange and assist in the installation of Battalion memorials; not least of which was a 6 foot stone obelisk that was made in Adelaide and shipped by air (RAAF) land (truck) and sea (barge & canoe) to Buna in Papua New Guinea.

Communiques

The chief means of keeping in touch for the members was the official newsletter "Communique" which has seen 546 issues circulated since 1946. It was primarily used to organise Anzac Day, Remembrance Day and other commemorative activities. It also related details of re-unions, family picnics and other functions. Letters from members were published and the activities and goings on of Battalion members reported. After WWII it was used as an employment exchange noting the availability of members for work and identifying opportunities for employment. It was also a means by which old mates could send each other personal greetings and messages in the days prior to when the telephones came into wide use. Its' success was achieved by the dedication of successive Editors and the enthusiasm of the contributors.

Patrons

Since 1946 the Association has had only 2 patrons. There is deep gratitude for the counsel and support given by them to the Association over the years. They are Lieutenant General Sir Thomas Daly KBE, CB, DSO and Major-General Neil Wilson AM RFD.

Adiós

In 2016 the difficult decision was made to wind up the Association. It was done with the knowledge that it had almost 100 years of history and tradition behind it. However, with the inevitable decline in veteran numbers and other avenues available to help fulfil the aims and objectives, it was a necessary decision to ensure a smooth, ordered and dignified transition. The completion of the winding up of the Association occurred in April 2017. The last official function of the Association Committee took place on the 21st of September 2017. It was to attend a centenary commemoration ceremony at the Adelaide Town Hall, for the action in 1917 which saw Roy Inwood awarded the Victoria Cross.

The aims of the Association continued to be fulfilled to the end with the dispersal of remaining funds to deserving recipients. Though the Association has ceased, its' legacy will live on.
