We normally do it for the love, but this year we were treated to a "shoot" at the WTTS facility by the CO Lt Col Burnard, and we rekindled new skills we thought we had lost. At another Battalion Field Exercise our Association members got to try on current war fighters kit and see how the Army of today trains. Sadly I missed out on that one as I was indisposed getting old body parts renewed.

Other "catering" jobs were to follow, along with the usual tasks like upgrading Honour Boards and manufacturing and presenting awards etc. This year was a little different as we neared November. The CO and his soldiers came to my adopted home town of Murray Bridge and helped us unveil a WW1 German artillery gun that was captured by 10th Battalion soldiers, including some from Murray Bridge, in 1918. The gun had been faithfully restored by men and veterans from the RSL and Murraylands Men's Shed, and is now pristine in "battlefield condition" at the front of the Murray Bridge RSL.

Then came our Association Formal Dinner, which although lacking numbers from previous years, still bought the old soldiers of the Regiment and the new together. Once again the marvelous Battalion Band, led by SGT David Portakiewicz, supported the dinner and once again proved how talented they are. Things were getting serious!

Along with others, we gathered at the Adelaide Town Hall to watch our soldiers exercise their right to a Freedom of the City of Adelaide. Seeing our "boys" march through the streets of Adelaide and then parade at Torrens Parade Ground was an awe inspiring sight, and in full view of the public, again did their Battalion proud. Sadly this was the last time that the Battalion Commanding Officer LTCOL Burnard would lead his soldiers in a Parade, and although we wish him success in his future postings, we also wish he wasn't going! He leaves BIG shoes to fill!

Then came the Armistice Week! I don't know about you, but I attended 3 engagements that week in Murray Bridge, and then conducted the Remembrance Day Service at the Murray Bridge Soldiers Memorial Hospital on behalf of the RSL.

Remembrance didn't end on the 11th. On Monday 12th November the Murray Bridge RSL hosted 200 students from Murray Bridge High School, after they walked across the road bridge under SAPOL escort in what was known as The "Peace March". (See pic below) To see them marching proudly, carrying Australian flags and led by their school band playing Waltzing Matilda bought a tear to my eye, as I realized these were the young folk who would carry our ANZAC heritage into the future, long after we are gone!

Like my colleagues in the RSAR Association I have had a busy year, but we wouldn't do it if we didn't love it, and supported by all of you reading this newsletter, we'll be back next year to do it bigger and better.

Letters to the Editor

The RSARA Committee were asked if we needed to compensate country/rural/interstate members for their subscription fees, as the majority are unable to attend any of our functions or exercises. Here are one members thoughts.

Gentlemen

I am writing to you tonight as I have trouble accepting and am concerned with the suggestion that subscription fees be reduced for remote members and associates members because they are unable to attend functions etc. I would ask you to consider the points outlined herein before making any firm decisions.

• First and foremost the annual membership fee for a full member is \$20 per annum or less than 5.5 cents a day, associate members are charged half that amount, it is hardly going to bankrupt anyone !

• How serious is the complaint of "not getting my monies worth" Does it justify a 50% reduction in fees - I think not.

• Membership fees account for the bulk of our income which in the main goes to supporting our Battalion, its Band and its soldiers as well as miscellaneous donations and grants to worthwhile ventures, all military related. Do we really want to take a voluntary reduction in our income?

• Members would understand that there is a personal cost to being part of this Organisation and, in the main, accept this despite a large number not being able to, or for any number of reasons including health issues, be directly involved in activities. It is the knowledge of knowing their financial contribution is helping out someone else that delivers the satisfaction, this is true for metropolitan, remote areas and overseas personnel. The pride of being part of this Association and its' ongoing work and effort is paramount and overrides the minimal personal cost.

• Suggesting that non involvement in activities deserves a discount is tantamount to saying I won't contribute to the Royal Flying Doctor Service because there is next to zero chance of me receiving a benefit or service from them.

• A move in this direction introduces yet another classification of membership (and fees) and carries with it the distinct possibility that it will cause anguish among metropolitan members who don't attend functions but are expected to pay full fees. This has the potential of being divisive issue, something to be avoided.

We are a united group and should remain as such - no them and us. We have been through the argument of country versus metro with the South East issues of the past. Surely we don't want to visit those issues again.

If the Committee of Management feels guilty about accepting full fees from "remote" members perhaps a small token of appreciation should be forwarded to these people by way of;

• A recognition certificate signed by the CoM Senior Office bearers thanking them for their contribution - sent on a bi-annual basis.

• Give aways - a lapel pin, cloth badge or stubble holder, again on a bi-annual basis

Some small token of gratitude recognising their membership, contribution and ongoing camaraderie.
