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Australia in the Vietnam War

Final part

By late 1970 Australia had also begun to wind down its military effort in Vietnam. The 8th Battalion departed in November (and was not replaced), but, to make up for the decrease in troop numbers, the Team's strength was increased and its efforts became concentrated in Phuoc Tuy province.

The withdrawal of troops and all air units continued throughout 1971 – the last battalion left Nui Dat on 7 November, while a handful of advisers belonging to the Team remained in Vietnam the following year. In December 1972 they became the last Australian troops to come home, with their unit having seen continuous service in South Vietnam for ten and a half years.

Australia's participation in the war was formally declared at an end when the Governor-General issued a proclamation on 11 January 1973. The only combat troops remaining in Vietnam were a platoon guarding the Australian embassy in Saigon (this was withdrawn in June 1973). In early 1975 the communists launched a major offensive in the north of South Vietnam, resulting in the fall of Saigon on 30 April.

During April a RAAF detachment of 7–8 Hercules transports flew humanitarian missions to aid civilian refugees displaced by the fighting and carried out the evacuation of Vietnamese orphans (Operation Babylift), before finally taking out embassy staff on 25 April.



From the time of the arrival of the first members of the Team in 1962 almost 60,000 Australians, including ground troops and air force and navy personnel, served in Vietnam; 521 died as a result of the war and over 3,000 were wounded. The war was the cause of the greatest social and political dissent in Australia since the conscription referendums of the First World War. Many draft resisters, conscientious objectors, and protesters were fined or gaoled, while most soldiers met a hostile reception on their return home.

Pte Edward Elart JUST SOLDIERS Part 3

The round hit Elart through one eye, travelled down his neck and exited through his shoulder, then continued its path through the face and shoulder of Morris. Freame dragged both soldiers to safety, but sadly for Elart, it was too late. His wound had proven fatal.

The commanding officer read Elart's letter with interest:

Sir, It is my desire to present myself as a defaulter before you. I am a deserter from the Royal Australian Navy. I am known here as Edward Elart but my real name is Harry Hart. My rating was Stoker HMAS "Australia" when I cut the painter at the time when war was least expected. When war broke out I left my job in Portland and went to Sydney with the object of surrendering myself. But when I reached there I thought of the long term of punishment to be gone through, and the reception a man would get on the ship, so I took advantage of the other outlet for my services to my country, and came as a soldier. It was my intention to remain silent and be "Edward Elart" always. The reason why I do not remain so is the experience of that memorable Sunday and also the attack by the enemy a few mornings ago, when my mates were shot on both sides of me, and when I was also slightly wounded make me realise that the honour of death may now be any mans and I wish to go out with a clean bill. It is for my sister's sake. I know that the penalty for my crime is a severe one and to say the least of it I could lose everything. I have weighed it over in my mind for a few days. But I have also heard that a free pardon has been granted to offenders of my calibre. Perhaps the authorities in their clemency may pardon me and count this as part of my five years service in the Navy (about 8 more years) when we go home again. I am writing this statement so as not to take up your valuable time in talking. My next of kin is Mrs G Turner, 40 Bronte St, East Perth. If she could one morning get a note saying that I could use my name again, it would be the finest present in the world I could make her.

Trusting that I may have the matter put before the authorities so soon as a favourable opportunity presents itself.

I am your obedient servant 103 Edward Elart 14 Platoon 'D' Coy 1st Battalion

At the Australian War Memorial, in front of the Hall of Memory where the remains of the Unknown Australian Soldier have been laid to rest, and overlooking the tranquil Pool of Reflection, are stone cloisters overlaid with bronze panels known as the Roll of Honour. On these panels are engraved the names of more than one hundred thousand Australian service men and women who have died in wars. Private Harry Hart, alias Edward Elart, is one of them.

Author's note: An estimated 150 Australian sailors deserted in World War 1 to serve in the ranks of various armies of the British Empire.

TEN Shortest Wars in History

No. 7 - Greco / Turkish War - 30 days



Year Fought: 1897

Between: Greece vs Ottoman Empire

Outcome: Greek defeat

The Greco-Turkish War of 1897, also called the Thirty Days' War, was a war between Greece and the Ottoman Empire, under its ruler Sultan Abdul Hamid. Its immediate cause was Greek concern over the situation in Crete, where the Greek population was still under Ottoman control. In late 1896 a rebellion broke out on Crete, and on January 21, 1897 a Greek army landed in Crete to unite the island with Greece. The European powers, however, intervened, and proclaimed Crete an international protectorate. The Ottomans defeated the Greeks within weeks. They were prevented from keeping their conquests by the European powers' intervention but Greece had to pay a large indemnity. This war was the only conflict between Greeks and Turks in the century where Greece was forced to cede land to Turkey. Some credit for the success of the Ottoman army in this war is given to the reforms put in place by the German Pasha Baron von der Goltz.



The RSAR association wishes to thank the young men of B Coy 10/27 RSAR who did us the honour of joining our ranks on this special day.






















































RSARA Association and 10/27 Battalion, working together.
