

You may recall a story in this newsletter some time ago about a project undertaken by the Murray Bridge RSL and the Murraylands Men’s Shed. A WW1 Krupp Artillery gun, bequeathed in 1920 to the community of Murray Bridge, was being restored to its battle-field condition after 98 years of being neglected in a local park.


I am pleased to say the gun was moved back to the Murray Bridge RSL last Monday and placed under cover (and under tarps) at the front of the RSL where it will await unveiling. The date set for this event is Sunday 16th September 2018, which is just 2 days short of its capture on the Western Front by members of our own 10th Battalion.



10/27 Battalion RSAR will provide a Catafalque Party and Bugler, and the CO LTCOL Burnard will assist the Mayor of Murray Bridge in the unveiling. A service, conducted by Murray Bridge RSL President David Laing, will commence at 1100 hrs, and will feature the blessing of the RSL Memorial stone on the front forecourt, prior to the unveiling.

If you are interested in history and would like to see the results of this wonderful restoration project, you’re welcome to attend. 16th September 1100 hrs.



The guy decided to invite the centipede one last time.


This time he put his face up against the centipede's box and shouted,

**Marree Man..... continued**

*Thanks Dave. The thought of a real “who done it” mystery was something I hadn’t expected when I took up the role as your Historical Officer.*

*For the uninitiated the MARREE MAN or STUART’S GIANT is a modern creation which depicts an indigenous Australian man hunting with a boomerang or stick. It lies on a plateau at Finnis Springs 60 km west of the township of Marree in central South Australia. The figure is 2.7 km tall with a perimeter of 28 kilometers. It was discovered by a charter pilot after a flight over the area on 26 June 1998. Suggestions by Dick Smith whose research includes suggestions it was created by late Alice Springs artist Bardius Goldberg, by local Indigenous people, by Americans and by the Australian Army.*

*Armed with what information I now had, my first line of enquiry was to source contacts within the Army Museum Keswick who may have served with Engineers and may provide some info about this Op.*

*Without hesitation I contacted Jeff Ayles whose knowledge and many contacts over the years has proved invaluable. He suggested having a talk with Nick Meredith also an Army Museum volunteer who back in his days was with 3 Fld. Sqn.*

*As a matter of courtesy I contacted Dick Smith to advise that I had taken up the challenge and once I had spoken with Nick would get back to him. A quick reply from Dick was “Thanks Des. Could you also find the dates that the unit worked on the construction of the Oak Valley Aerodrome? The Marree Man would have only taken a few days and use two drums of diesel! Look forward to hearing from you! Dick “*

*Well done Jeff. Good call.*

*Nick I was to find out was actually the OC 3 Fld. Sqn which in 1997 was ordered at short notice to provide support for the Australian Army Community Assistance Project. A troop commanded by the then 21C Capt Rye spent 2 weeks at Oak Valley, an aboriginal community some 130 Kms. North West of Maralinga in S.A. The Task involved construction of water collection and storage facilities, refurbishment of refuse facilities, airstrip and road maintenance. From there my next contact was Dave Rye, who was good enough to provide the following :-  
“Hey Des, not much more to add I am afraid to what Nick has probably already told you. Yes 3 Fd Sqn did deploy to Oak Valley in 1997 for a two week period where we undertook a number of tasks under the Army Aboriginal Community Assistance Program (AACAP). Our main task was the construction of a couple of water catchment tanks. These consisted of a large metal frame structures with an inverted roof that feed into a steel water tank. The tanks came as a flat pack and we had to also construct these. Typically for Engineers, we ended up exceeding our brief and managed to get the airstrip, which was already there but deemed unsafe for use, back up to a point where the Flying Doctors were able to re-use the strip. We also dug a tip for the community and did some minor work on their roads.*

*I should point out that our efforts were a prelude to a larger push by 17 Construction Squadron who followed us out to Oak Valley in the following year and were on the ground for several months. I believe they were actually constructing houses for the community and also undertaking some training opportunities in basic trade skills. I am not sure (or cannot remember) if they did any additional work to the airstrip ..... ”*

Our Facebook page and Website continue to attract interest from around the world, and it truly is an intelligent way of communication. A new Facebook page titled "Band of the 10<sup>th</sup>/27<sup>th</sup> Battalion" has recently popped up, and I urge you to visit the page and witness the camaraderie of its' members.

Some articles on our Facebook page attract over 1,000 viewers in less than 24 hours, and this is an indication of their interest in our work.

From time to time I get enquiries from members about "where do my annual fees go?" and what do regional, interstate and overseas members get for their buck?

*All information was passed on to Dick Smith who I believe did personally contact Nick Meredith recently for some further clarification.*


*GPS as we know it today was I believe not available at the time MARREE MAN was created.

the ANZAC Day dawn services and March, Junior Leaders Course graduation parades, and several commemorative services and Mess dinners. In total the Band has conducted 32 tasks so far this year.

The main highlight for the year so far was the

Band concert held in June at the Murray Bridge Town hall where it helped raised funds for both the RSARA and MB RSL.

The Band is excited about supporting the RSARA annual Dining in night in October and the Battalion Armistice Ball on 3 November at the Convention centre where I hope to see you all.

The Band has been honoured this year by being invited by the Governor of SA to support the Government House Investitures in the second week of September. The Band will support all 4 of these ceremonies being held at Government House.

The Band has also continued its strong push to recruit new members. The Band has enlisted 2 new members with a further 2 new members passing their auditions and awaiting enlistment dates. We even have one of our newest recruits present today PTE Corey Skapin who graduated from Kapooka in February this year.

The Band continues to improve in leaps and bounds and their great work would not be possible without the continued support of the Association, especially its committee members. **From the Commanding Officer 10th/27th Battalion RSAR AGM Speech**

Ladies and Gentlemen

It gives me great pleasure to speak to you today. Firstly I wanted to start by saying thank you to all the members of the Association because without your support much that has been done over the last 2.5 years would not have been possible. Your support in taking care of the members of the Battalion, through preparing and cooking meals, sorting out honour boards, plaques and the many other tasks sets this association apart from the others in the state, indeed a former RSM of this unit has received RSARA as the envy of many units in the Army. As I near the end of my tenure as CO I can say that this unit has in every sense become a combined arms battlegroup. .



As you would know it is no longer the Reserve unit that many of you would remember. It is without question a far more agile, lethal and protected force than at any time in its history. The Battalion battlegroup is much more secure in its knowledge of the other corps. The relationships within the battlegroup have continued to develop. We have three Arms corps, transport and ordnance corps amongst others. We have a transport 2IC, an armoured corps ADJT, and Infantry 2IC on full time service in the Engineer squadron, a Signaller and an Engineer as 2IC of the Infantry companies.

For now, let me speak very briefly about where the unit the state of the Unit. Since the last AGM, which unfortunately I was unable to attend we have seen a number of changes, we've had many successes and been directed to undertake many tasks. We have deployed members on operations. Our own Regimental Sergeant Major is due to return to Australia from Operation Augury in 7 days time after training the Philippine Army to combat the threat of terrorism in their country. Indeed a number of us were selected to support operations in the Middle East but for a range of reasons were not called forward.

We have returned a significant number of soldiers from Rifle Company Butterworth. The unit has now finished its Reset year where it has spent a considerable period of time training its members and supporting other units to train soldiers and officers also. We have qualified nearly every officer in their ADF Range Qualifications and most officers are now rank

and trade qualified. In fact a sizeable number of soldiers, NCOs and officers have spent the last year getting themselves qualified for their next rank and as such I am very happy to say that later in the year I expect many will be promoted. We have also spent the year adjusting to the changes that have resulted from the 2nd Division Transformation, which have seen us gain capability in some areas, but lose it others, namely we have fewer Regular Army cadre staff to carry out much of the day to day work within the battlegroup. We have proudly sent engineers in support of the Australian Army Aboriginal Community Assistance program.

We are now actively involved in community engagement with the Aboriginal community in Murray Bridge. We are now well into our recently directed planning and training for our domestic security and emergency tasks. Training that was well executed and has prepared us well for future certification March next year. We have achieved nearly every support task that we have been asked to achieve over the last financial year and we can be justifiably proud of our hard work, our dedication, our loyalty and our professionalism.

The next 12 months will be equally if not more demanding. We have entered the readying cycle as we again prepare ourselves for Ex Talisman Sabre and deployments after that time. We will again be sending soldiers and officers on our whole of government Border protection operation as well as Rifle Company Butterworth in Malaysia and once again it looks promising for members of the Battlegroup to be called for operations in the Middle East...on the proviso that they have participated in the three major exercises this year. In September we commence training the Battlegroup on the Enhanced F88, a significantly more lethal weapon system and one that can guarantee even the most average of combat shots the ability to provide effective fire out to 600 metres.

## From the Commanding Officer 10th/27th Battalion RSAR continued

This year also marks the end of the 100 years of Anzac. Armistice day will be a poignant reminder of the day that brought an end to what, at the time, was the greatest conflagration in human history. Through the unit and the community observing this day we are reminded of the sacrifice of all the men and women that gave their lives. I read the other day that by some coincidence there have now been exactly 100 Australian VC winners and as many of you would know only 4 of them are alive. Remembering the Armistice matters because as a result of WW1 there are more than 102,000 names inscribed on the National war memorial. The pain that each of the families of those 102,000 men and women would have felt following the loss of their loved ones needs deep reflection to truly understand if you haven't experienced that sort of grief yourself. Remembering this year's Armistice matters, because we must continue to strive for peace and understand the cost of war. We do not celebrate, we commemorate but whilst we commemorate and remember those sacrifices we must also train for war, for that is our role and you can be assured that the unit is heavily invested in this. To that end the battlegroup will march through the centre of the city during this year's Freedom of Entry on the 03 November and the Battlegroups end of year ball will be held on the same night at the convention centre. All ranks will wear service dress in memory of those that celebrated the end of the war 100 years ago. RSARA members will be given the opportunity to purchase tickets to attend.

Finally, amongst our many official duties that soldiers and officers will undertake on the 11 Nov 18 we will also unveil the city's largest mural on the walls of the Q store at Keswick barracks. Overlooking the railway line and the Royal Adelaide Show grounds the mural promises to commemorate the history of South Australia's reserve heritage from the Boer war to the current day.
