MEMBERS VISIT WARRADALE BARRACKS WTTS



The Weapons Training Simulation System (WTSS) is a virtual weapons range designed to allow soldiers to practice weapon handling drills, marksmanship principles and fire control orders. The facility also allows soldiers to fire a wide variety of weapons including the F88 Steyr rifle, F89 Minimi Light Support Weapon and the 84mm Carl Gustav anti-armour weapon.

On Tuesday 1st September 14 members of the RSAR Association paid a visit to Warradale Barracks and took part in some target practice at the WTTS Facility.

Prior to entering the WTTS, the members were given a demonstration by soldiers from 3 FD SQDN on how to locate an IED (Improvised Explosive Device) using one of the Army's Minelab Explosives Detectors. Some members were lucky enough to have a go themselves, and remarked how hard it was holding the device and concentrating on the ground cover.

The group then moved into the WTTS where they fired the F88 Steyr and were surprised at the modern way in which our soldiers are trained. The WTTS is fully automated and computerized, and allows realistic shooting scenarios to be carried out, all without live ammunition. After the oldies had their fun, they were shown how REAL soldiers use the facility, with 5 diggers from 3 FD SQN taking up fire positions to counter an enemy threat.

After the demonstrations the group moved down to the "Rats Nest", the aptly named



soldiers canteen facility, where they were provided with a BBQ dinner, courtesy of 3 FD SQDN, and a few beers courtesy of Rod Beames PMCs card.

OC 3FD SQDN Major Sam Benveniste welcomed the RSAR Association to Warradale Barracks and said he was determined to have closer ties with the Association, and was certain the Engineers and the Infantry could work well together, as they had done in the past, and none better than on the battlefields of Iraq and Afghanistan.

Rod Beames thanked CO 10/27 Bn LTCOL Graham Goodwin for helping the tour to take place, and thanked the soldiers of 10/27 Bn and 3 FD SQDN for their courtesy and support during the demonstrations and the BBQ afterwards.

We all thank Beamsey for setting it up in the first place.

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In the meantime, unbeknown to Eric, his mother had written to Army Headquarters back home in Australia and implored the authorities to remove Eric from active duty. In a heartfelt letter, she explained how she had already lost two sons and Eric was her only surviving child. Her request was denied, the authorities stating, 'There are no distressful circumstances surrounding the case'.

As the tempo of the desert campaign escalated, it was found that the camels were too slow to keep up so the decision was made to disband the corps. The cameleers were not happy that they would be separated from their four-legged 'friends'. However, their

performance as members of the Camel Corps was something of which they could all be proud and they were confident they were equal to the challenges that lay ahead when they took up their new postings with the 14th and 15th Light Horse Regiments.

The ANZAC troopers endured a scorching summer as the campaign progressed across the Jordan Valley. As well as the intolerable heat, the Diggers had to exist on a diet of greasy bully beef and stinking water from Arab wells, but they had the enemy on the run and were determined to maintain the pressure—unsatisfactory living conditions were of little consequence. In early October 1918, Eric's regiment was assembled on parade and advised that those who had enlisted in 1914 would be sent home to Australia on furlough. Eric knew he met the criteria to go home, but felt to leave now would be letting his mates down. He then considered his Mum and how much it would mean to her to know he was safe back home. With that thought in mind, he got out his kit bag and started to pack his gear. Before leaving

the regiment, and still a month shy of 19, Eric was promoted to Warrant Officer Class Two.

Amid the streamers being thrown by the enthusiastic well-wishers and to the loud music being played by the band on the pier, Eric strode down the gangway of the troopship Devon as she docked in Sydney. Waiting for him was his mother—dressed in black and looking much older than Eric remembered her. He wasted no time pushing through the crowd to reach her. She hugged Eric with an intensity that not only showed the delight she felt at seeing her youngest boy, but displayed the magnitude of the grief she felt for the two sons who would never return. Eric was discharged as medically unfit on 16 December 1918.

After the war, Eric married his sweetheart, Marjory, and the couple took up farming on the outskirts of Windsor in New South Wales. They had five children, three boys and two girls—the eldest boy was named Robert, in memory of one of Eric's brothers.

The family tried to work the land through the difficult years of the Depression, but the venture was unsuccessful. Subsequently, Eric sought work as a commercial traveller and moved his family to the Sydney suburb of Kingsford.

A little more than twenty years after the signing of the Armistice and the end of the Great War, Germany again was engaged in acts of aggression on her European neighbours. By September 1939, Australia was once more at war. In June 1940, Eric marched into the barracks at Paddington to enlist for service in the 2nd AIF. He was allocated to the Army Service Corps and posted to the 1st Corps Ammunition Sub Park. He soon settled back into the routine of army life and in August of that year he was made acting corporal. His unit embarked for the Middle East on the 14 September 1940 and a month later arrived at Haifa, a large Mediterranean seaport in northwest Israel. Eric was promoted to substantive corporal in November 1940.

OUR COAT OF ARMS



The first granting of armorial bearings to the Commonwealth of Australia was made in 1908. A new design was granted by Royal Warrant on 19 September 1912.

The branches of wattle used as an ornamental accessory to the shield, representing the badges of the six States as they were in 1912, were not mentioned in the blazon, but were depicted in the coloured illustration included in the gazettal of the Australian armorial bearings. There are conventional versions of the bearings for formal printing and other formal media. The wattle depicted has clusters of spherical flower heads coloured yellow and blue-grey, and green phyllodes characteristic of many species of Acacia.

It is not a botanically accurate representation of *A. pycnantha.* Stylised versions are also used:

On 9th August 2015 the AGM of the Royal South Australia Regiment Association Inc was held at the SA Sea Rescue Squadron, Barcoo Rd West Beach.

The Minutes of the AGM are available by contacting the Secretary.

Main points to come out of the meeting were:

- 1. Election of Officers resulted in David Hope joining the Committee as Assistant Treasurer, to assist Alan Orrock for 12 months. David will officially take over from Alan at the next AGM.
- 2. No nominations were forthcoming for the Secretaries position, therefore David Laing will remain as Secretary until a replacement is found. (It is hoped someone from the Battalion can take up this role.)
- The Secretary reports the Association is in a strong position and that membership 3. has more than quadrupled in the past 5 years. This can be put down to more inter-action with the Battalion and constant updating of the website and Facebook page. 4.
