Guy has had a long and exciting career in the both the Australian Army and the RAAF, and has deployed overseas on a number of occasions. One of Guys' last roles in the RAAF was as Aide De Corps for the then Governor of South Australia, Rear Admiral Kevin Scarce, who retired at the end of last year.



Guy began his involvement with the military joining as an Army Cadet back in the early 80's, and from there progressed to the Army Reserve (and 10/27 RSAR) before joining the RAAF as an Armaments Fitter. He took leave from the RAAF and joined British Aerospace, working for the Royal Saudi Air Force as a Training Team Supervisor on Tornado fighter bombers during Operation Desert Shield/ Desert Storm. On his return from deployment he rejoined the RAAF where he was commissioned into the RAAF Reserve as Operations Officer. His last deployment was to Operation Slipper as Joint Operations J33 Staff Officer in 2011.

His knowledge of the links between air force and army are above reproach, and anyone interested in the military and its operations will find his talk extremely interesting.

Just Soldiers Trooper Sloan "Scotty" Bolton DCM Part 4

At a distance of two and a half kilometres from the forward trenches, Bourchier commanded his men to charge. The steady canter of the horsemen reached the crescendo of the gallop and, hooves thundering, they bore down mercilessly on their hapless foe in a deadly, destructive wave.

As the horsemen surged forward, the Turkish batteries opened fire with a mixture of shrapnel and high explosive. The projectiles burst among the forward ranks.

Men were blown from their saddles and some horses fell, but the charge did not falter. The Turkish gunners watched the charge, lowering the barrels of their guns, waiting for the dismount that never came. Suddenly the Light Horse regiments were below the trajectory of the guns.

Pushing his Waler at full gallop, Trooper Bolton reached down and grasped the handle of his bayonet, extracting the 18-inch blade from its scabbard. The Turks now set their rifle sights to a range of 1600 metres as the riflemen and machine-gunners readied themselves. The volley of lead cut through the lines of horsemen, but the thirsty horses could smell the water—there was no stopping them.

Bolton's horse, Monty, careered wildly and he fought hard to regain control of his plunging beast. He was later to find that a bullet had narrowly missed his own leg, hitting instead the pannikin hanging from the saddle. This had deflected the round, carving a 12-inch gouge along the horse's rump.

The Turkish riflemen fired wildly at the approaching horde. At the sight of the rampaging Australians, some Turks threw down their weapons and ran towards the town, others chose to fight to the end. The defenders were ordered to save the guns and the Turkish horse teams galloped forward to salvage what they could.

The first wave of the light horse now reached the forward enemy line. As the horses leaped across the open trenches, many of the Turks crouched and thrust their rifles and bayonets upward to disembowel the horses in mid-flight. The remnants of the first wave carried on to engage the support trenches.

The scene had become a bloody shambles of rifle and revolver fire. The rip and slash of wielded bayonets punctuated the air and one horse was seen to join the fight, rearing and striking out with its fore-hooves. Scotty galloped through to the second line, attacking two Turks with his bayonet. As he rode towards the centre of town, he spotted a Turkish soldier running towards a house. Galloping over, Bolton kicked the Turk, forcing him to the ground, retrieving his revolver as he lay dazed. Elements of the 12th Light Horse were already weaving their way through the streets, and some were watering their horses in the captured wells. One trooper fell to his knees in a Turkish canvas water trough, and drank side-by-side with his horse. Suddenly a well exploded, then another and yet another, the last blast almost throwing Bolton from his horse. On the ground he noticed a number of wires leading to a building. Bolton peered through an open window and caught sight of a German officer operating a switchboard. He sprang from the saddle and burst through the door.

An Experience of War

Part 12

In the book We Band of Brothers I describe the rigours of the next hour.

'It seemed a lifetime before we started to stretcher him down to D Coy and the LZ. I was very worried about his condition. The stretcher carry was a long distance over very rough ground and I stopped the party every few minutes to give Vic a break as much as the carriers. We were also concerned about being bumped by the enemy along the way so we could not linger for too long. Vic stood up to the rigours very stoically but much of the time he drifted in and out of consciousness. When we got to the LZ I was pleased to see our Medical Officer, Captain Vic Bampton and Padre Les Thompson. The RMO administered plasma to Vic and he rallied a little but he was still gravely ill'.

But, Vic's ordeal was not yet over. As the Dust Off helicopter rose from the LZ it thrashed its way through tree foliage to exit the tiny hole that D Coy had hacked out of the jungle and in doing so severely damaged its rotor blades. The aircraft could barely maintain height and as it hugged the mountain side its fuselage was raked by enemy fire. Unable to land at the US 36th Evacuation Hospital helipad, because he would be unable to take off again, the pilot put down on the Vung Tau airstrip. Vic was then transported to the hospital by ambulance.

I had watched in awe as a US Dust Off helicopter had landed under machine gun and mortar fire to evacuate Prowse and Winterford several weeks earlier and I was to witness a similar feat of courage on this occasion. I have the greatest admiration for these anonymous American pilots who put their own lives on the line for us Australians.

Doris - married ('Harry') Henry Franklin TWINING in 1942 and had a son, John


Beryl - married Ernest Elliott GARDNER in 1947 and had a daughter, Marilyn

Within a few days I received a letter from Vic Morrow written in painfully tortured handwriting. It read in part.

Jonesy, and all in 9 Platoon

I hope you can read this, my writing arm is a bit tied up. I want to thank you for the job you did on me the other day.

I don't know whether you know what was the matter with me but I had three broken ribs, a hole in my lung, a hole in the liver and a hole in my diaphragm and the muscle in my arm blown out so I was pretty crook.

I used 44 pints of blood before I stopped leaking, that is the hospital record. They nearly cut me in half to fix my insides up, it goes about two inches below my tit and goes to the back of my shoulder blade.

According to the doctor I should have been dead. He reckoned he aged four years in one night.

I am going home tomorrow and I will write now and again so watch out for the Charlies if you are looking for a homer don't try this one. It will get you home alright but by hell it's a bloody hard way to go about it.
