In the gathering dusk of 18 August 1966, 108 young, inexperienced Australian soldiers from Delta Company, 6th Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment were separated from their main force in Nui Dat and surrounded, fighting for their lives, holding off an overwhelming force of 2,500 battle-hardened Viet Cong and North Vietnamese soldiers. In the pouring rain, amid the mud and shattered trees of a rubber plantation called Long Tan, with their ammunition running out and another Vietnamese battalion massing for the final assault, the digger's situation seemed hopeless. Through the night and into the next day they fought a vastly superior enemy force, and only after support from NZ artillery and ammunition resupply

from Huey helicopters and M113 Armoured Personnel Carriers did they turn the tide of battle. After losing an estimated 800 dead and wounded the enemy disengaged and withdrew.

18 brave Australian soldiers paid the supreme sacrifice during the battle.

On **Saturday 20th August**

2016 the Murray Bridge RSL will conduct a March and Service to commemorate the 50th anniversary of that battle, to honour the fallen.

The March will leave Diamond Park, Adelaide Rd, Murray Bridge at 1000 hrs and proceed to the Murray Bridge Town Hall, where the service will take place from 1015 hrs. Former and Serving personnel who wish to march should report to Diamond Park by 0945 hrs. Full medals should be worn.

The Murray Bridge RSL respectfully invites the community to attend the commemorative service at the Murray Bridge Town Hall, and to view the marchers as they arrive. Drinks and nibbles will be available At The Murray Bridge RSL after the service.

What's happening in Afghanistan?

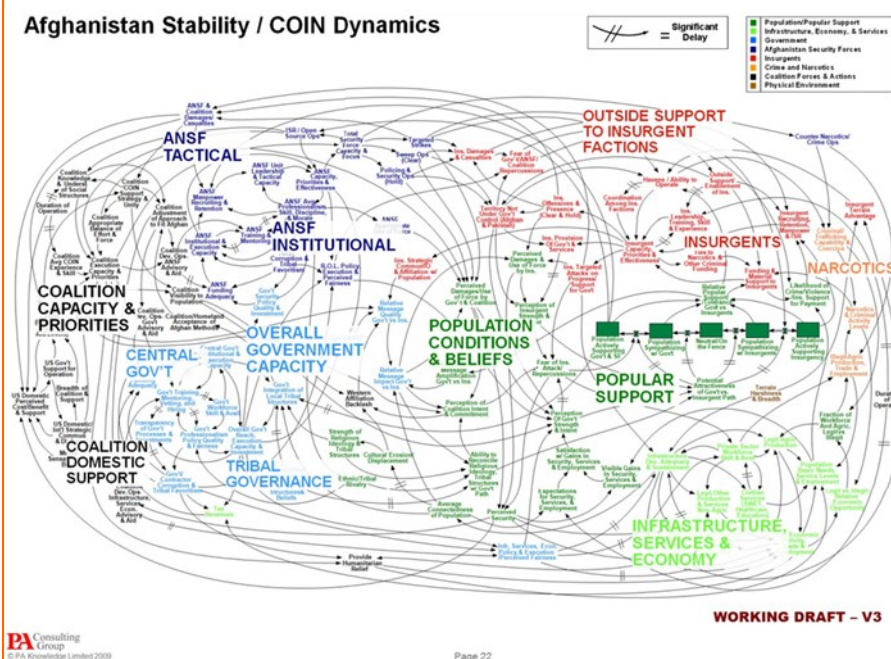

There continues to be a number of bad incidents and the insurgents have been proving themselves to be very resourceful fighters. Their latest work is attached below where they targeted buses with a number of new police cadets on board. Very sad as they are very much needed to provide police services both in Kabul and the regions. They are poorly trained and poorly paid,

coupled with high corruption, it does not make for a good platform for community policing. I have provided advice re this but it is such a massive task I am not sure there is much appetite to making wholesale change. This was also very much the situation in East Timor. Police were employed initially for a specific purpose and as things developed it is very clear they don't have the skills to develop at the same pace. Such a stance dominates the landscape, long term planning does not appear to have been a strong feature.



Have the pleasure of working with some really good US (and other coalition) members. One is a guy called Raja Stoble. He looks exactly like Uncle Fester out of the Adams Family, and is a bit goofy like that as well (he is always dropping his phone). Anyway he is a reservist as well-in civilian life a nuclear engineer, in military an engineer on a nuclear sub! Funny guy, but good to have around when looking at some of the things that we do. I responded, 'I guess not. What do you have in mind?' She said, 'Let's drop by my place, it's just around the corner.'

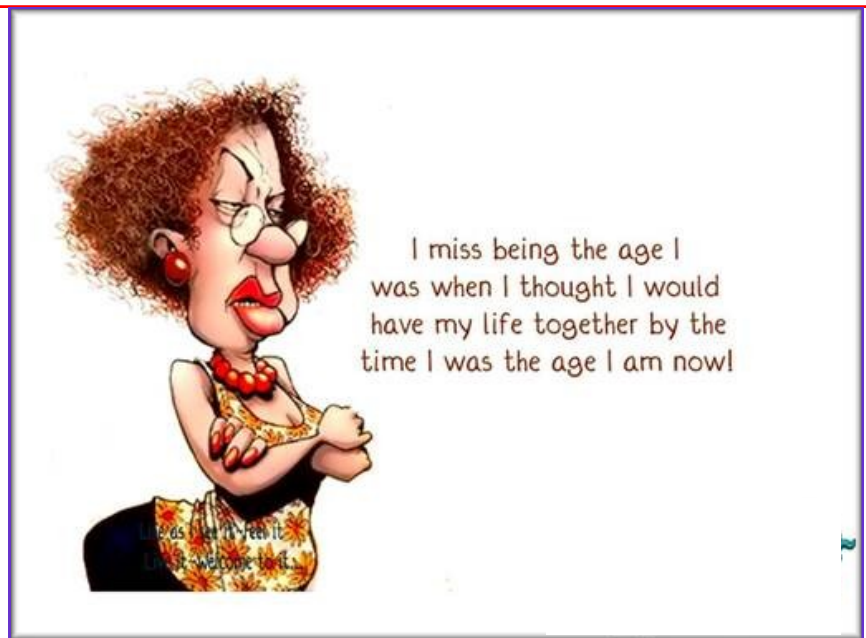
