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RSARA Historical Officer Des Hawkins has been busy in his efforts to see the gravesite restored of former WW1 CO of 10 Bn, LTCOL Maurice Wilder-Neligan. See below the correspondence Des received from Department of Veterans Affairs in Port Moresby PNG.

Good morning Des

I trust you are well.

I just wanted to provide you with an update on the restoration and maintenance of LTCOL Wilder-Neligan's grave, prior to your meeting tomorrow.

I will be travelling to Kimbe on 19 July to meet with Cheyne Benjamin from Walindi Resort who is assisting this Office with these works.

The intent is to:

- Meet with the local landowners to discuss the ongoing maintenance of the site following construction of the new grave
- If they can assist, we will prepare a design for the area including the design of the new grave which is proposed to be a standard OAWG 'Post-War' grave
- Meet a local contractor to discuss construction of the new grave and the immediate surrounds (with intention of clearly defining the area, providing a pathway from the road and keeping the jungle at bay
- We'll also investigate options for:
 - A. What to do with the existing headstone
 - B. Where the commemorative plaque you are proposing may best be placed

I'll keep you updated on progress.

Thanks and please let me know if you have any questions.



From time to time, when it seems like life is not always "like a box of chocolates," something happens that simply puts things in a better perspective. This happened to President Rod Beames recently and he just had to phone me and tell me about his "absolutely magnificent day!" Here's what he wrote!

I was just walking out of Dr Jones & Partners following my PET scan when my phone rang.

The guy identified himself as being a SA Government employee and asked could I get him a copy of the "transfer papers for Torrens Parade Ground to the State Government. Surely your association would have a copy". A little confused I asked why. "Because (I found your number on the website and some of my colleagues said you'd know everything) (he went on) you might remember a track that went along the back of Keswick Barracks next to the railway line which is now closed and we cant get access". I recalled the track some years ago and said it was still there but blocked off with some cyclone fencing..... "No" he said, "at the northern end, the gate has been removed and all access blocked. It now appears to be run by the railways and if the documents surrounding the Torrens Parade Ground transfer can be found then it might be possible to equate this to the Keswick scenario". Slightly confused I said leave it with me and I will get back within 24 hours .I made a few phone calls to the old and bold of the Regiment and these conformed my understanding. There is no relationship between the two. Further, I was able to ascertain that the



Torrens Parade Ground is currently under the Heritage Unit of the Department of Environment and Water whereas the Keswick land was transferred to the railways. Armed with this knowledge I left him a message and when he called me back I suggested some names from people at Keswick or that he try the Australian Railways. The reply was don't give me serving Army members because they are too young to remember. He went on to explain that because the track was closed, the contract to get the adjoining hedge cut for the past 6 years had been unsuccessful and he was trying to get an Memorandum Of Understanding to fix this. It just happens that I was having coffee that afternoon with someone familiar with the railways OH&S requirements and knew exactly who to contact and where he was located. So with all questions answered and relayed I hung up the phone and felt pretty chuffed.

Why? Someone has enough nous to ask around and give me a call and ask for help.

I was able, using our Old & Bold network, to find answers to all his questions.

Moe Berg - Baseballer or?

When baseball greats Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig went on tour in baseball-crazy Japan in 1934, some fans wondered why a third-string catcher named Moe Berg was included. Although he played with five major-league teams from 1923 to 1939, he was a very mediocre ball player. But Moe was regarded as the brainiest ballplayer of all time.

Casey Stengel once said: "That is the strangest man ever to play baseball." He also said about Berg, "He spoke 7 languages but couldn't hit in any of them." Good 'ol Casey! When all the baseball stars went to Japan, Moe Berg went with them and many people wondered why he went with "the team."

The answer was simple: Moe Berg was a United States spy, working undercover with the CIA. Moe spoke 15 languages - including Japanese. And he had two loves: baseball and spying. In Tokyo, garbed in a kimono, Berg took flowers to the daughter of an American diplomat being treated in St. Luke's Hospital - the tallest building in the Japanese capital.

He never delivered the flowers. The ball-player ascended to the hospital roof and filmed key features: the harbor, military installations, railway yards, etc. Eight years later, General Jimmy Doolittle studied Berg's films in planning his spectacular raid on Tokyo.

His father disapproved of his baseball career and never once watched his son play. In Barringer High School, Moe learned Latin, Greek and French. Moe read at least 10 newspapers every day. He graduated magna cum laude from Princeton - having added Spanish, Italian, German and Sanskrit to his linguistic quiver. During further studies at the Sorbonne, in Paris, and Columbia Law School, he picked up Japanese, Chinese, Korean, Indian, Arabic, Portuguese and Hungarian - 15 languages in all, plus some regional dialects.

While playing baseball for Princeton University, Moe Berg would describe plays in Latin or Sanskrit.





During World War II, Moe was parachuted into Yugoslavia to assess the value to the war effort of the two groups of partisans there.

He reported back that Marshall Tito's forces were widely supported by the people and Winston Churchill ordered all-out support for the Yugoslav underground fighter, rather than Mihajlovic's Serbians.

The parachute jump at age 41 undoubtedly was a challenge. But there was more to come in that same year. Berg penetrated German-held Norway, met with members of the underground and located a secret heavywater plant - part of the Nazis' effort to build an atomic bomb. His information guided the Royal Air Force in a bombing raid to destroy that plant

The R.A.F. destroys the Norwegian heavy water plant targeted by Moe Berg. There still remained the question of how far had the Nazis progressed in the race to build the first Atomic bomb.

If the Nazis were successful, they would win the war. Berg (under the code name "Remus") was sent to Switzerland to hear leading German physicist Werner Heisenberg, a Nobel Laureate, lecture and determine if the Nazis were close to building an A-bomb. Moe managed to slip past the SS guards at the auditorium, posing as a Swiss graduate student.

If the German indicated the Nazis were close to building a weapon, Berg was to shoot him - and then swallow the cyanide pill. Moe, sitting in the front row, determined that the Germans were nowhere near their goal, so he complimented Heisenberg on his speech and walked him back to his hotel.

Moe Berg's report was distributed to Britain's Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, President Franklin D. Roosevelt and key figures in the team developing the Atomic Bomb. Roosevelt responded: "Give my regards to the catcher."


Most of Germany's leading physicists had been Jewish and had fled the Nazis mainly to Britain and the United States.

After the war, Moe Berg was awarded the Medal of Freedom - America's highest honor for a civilian in wartime.

But Berg refused to accept it, because he couldn't tell people about his exploits. After his death, his sister accepted the medal. It now hangs in the Baseball Hall of Fame, in Cooperstown.

A REFLECTION ON THE PLATINUM JUBILEE OF HER MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH II.

This year we celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II after an unprec-

edented 70 years on the throne. As Colonel-in-Chief of the Royal Australian Infantry Corps, of which the Royal South Australia Regiment is under, it is fitting that we pay tribute to Her Majesty's unwavering service and dedication to the Commonwealth and the Armed Forces.

The Queen has a personal relationship with the military being a daughter, wife, mother, and grandmother of individuals who have served in the Armed Forces. Indeed, wanting to do her part in the war effort, the Queen joined the Auxiliary Territorial Service (ATS) as a mechanic in 1945, becoming the first female member of the Royal Family to join the Armed Forces as a full-time active member. The Queen has visited Australia on 16 occasions, including various visits to our barracks, bases and personnel across the country.

The Queen also shares a personal connection with the Australian Army when her grandson, Prince Harry, was seconded and took part in counter-terrorism exercises with 2 Commando Regiment and undertook training with the North



-West Mobile Force. Capturing the ANZAC spirit, The Queen stated in her 1988 ANZAC Day address in Hobart that 'each Anzac Day when the Last Post sounds ... it is a call of awakening and re-dedication, to remind us of the standards for which we should all strive when we are called upon to do our duty'.

I believe our Regiment's motto, *Pro Patria* (For Country) is embodied no greater than by the Queen, who ever since her 21st birthday has pledged that her 'whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong'. Over the past 70 years, the Queen has faithfully served the Commonwealth and the Armed Forces, becoming the embodiment of duty and service which we should all recognise and celebrate.

Remembering one or our own. Phil Brookes

So many cemeteries, so many graves of young, and not so young men who had given their all. It was at Dernancourt, where many South Australians fought, that I specifically sought a grave of a 10th Bn – *the fighting tenth* - soldier. It was my grandfather's unit and one that I served in generations later.

I paused at many graves and wondered about these men, most in the prime of their youth, who travelled so far. Was it adventure? But one grave caught my eye; that of 1140 Pte John Peter Henry Olden, a photographer from Ballarat who, at 44 years and 11 months, enlisted at Keswick Barracks on 4 January 1916. He was not married and his mother, living in Ballarat, was his NOK.

We would wonder why a man of middle age, would forgo life in Australia to go to war. Maybe it was a photographers natural curiosity; we will never know; or was it some latent martial spirit as John Olden had spent five years in the 3rd Victorian Regiment, whose forerunner was the 3rd Ballarat Infantry. His brother was also a military man, Lt Col O L Olden, whose address was shown as C/- Naval and Military Club, Hobart. Interestingly, John Olden was initially rejected for military service; his military record giving the reason for the rejection as 'teeth'; no further explanation. Did he have too many, not enough, none at all or were they yellowed canine fangs, upsetting to the tidy military mind? However, he obviously overcame this deficiency as he was soon on his way to France.

Pte Olden was initially posted to 43 Bn and then to B Coy, 10th Bn, embarking from Adelaide's Outer Harbour on 9 June 1916 and disembarking at Marseilles on 20 July 1916. Less than four months later he would be dead. We can imagine Olden's initial images of France; they would have delighted his sharp photographic eye as he travelled by train through the South of France to Paris. Beautiful villages, rolling bucolic countryside and the colour and romance of Paris would role past in kaleidoscope of a brilliant French summer. It was only a short train ride further north; that hellish nightmare of the Somme; *Dante's Inferno* could be no worse.

There is very little In John Olden's military record that gives us a hint of the man resting in that peaceful cemetery. His conduct sheet is clean, which you would expect of an older, mature man. The flush of youth had passed him by and he no longer had that nonchalant cockiness and disdain for rank of his younger, more feisty comrades. Maybe he was a calming fatherly influence on these boisterous colonials. The entry of his death states: 'Died of wounds after an evening air raid'. The location was 3 Field Ambulance, 1st ANZAC Rest Station. He died on 11 November 1916; exactly two years later the Armistice would be signed. We can only assume John Olden was resting out of the line after a 'stunt', as the rest station would have been in the rear echelon. His mother received a pension of two pounds per fortnight; she died in in 1921; no doubt her heart broken by the loss of her son, so far away and unable to visit his grave. It was his brother, Lt Col Olden, who ensured a poignant and final epitaph was placed on John Olden's grave;

He lived and died for others

And, for a short time on ANZAC Day 2015, a later comrade from your Battalion paused, placed an Australian flag at your feet and said a silent prayer. You are in good company.
