





Lest We Forget



The custom of observing a minute's silence on Remembrance Day (and other Remembrance occasions) is largely due to one Australian man, soldier and journalist Edward Honey.

Honey suggested the idea of 'the Great Silence' while working at a newspaper in London in 1919.

(Edward George Honey (1885-1922) was born in St Kilda, Melbourne, and educated at Caulfield Grammar School.

He served briefly with the British Army during the First World War before being medically discharged as an invalid with shellshock.)


As a result of Edward Honey's suggestion, King George V delivered his now famous message, asking that:

"The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, there may be for the brief space of two minutes a complete suspension of all our normal activities... so that in perfect stillness, the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance"

The custom of 1 or 2 minutes' silence now occurs throughout much of the Commonwealth of Nations and today, Edward Honey is commemorated with a small plaque in Northwood Cemetery, London, and a modest monument near the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne.



I've spoken before about this book after member Peter Loveder put me onto it. In between looking after a granddaughter, buying and selling our caravan and helping mates build ensuite toilets I managed to get started on the book and have been delighted I did. You may also recall our efforts to restore the grave of one of the earliest CO's of the 10th Battalion, LTCOL Maurice Wilder-Neligan? Well, as coincidence would have it, Wilder-Neligan is mentioned on numerous occasions in the book, being one of the original Stealth Raiders. A review of the book online states.....



A vivid exploration of the audacious, unauthorised stealth attacks of Australian infantrymen on the German front line in 1918

In 1918 a few daring low-ranking Australian infantrymen, alone among all the armies on the Western Front, initiated stealth raids without orders. These stealth raiders killed Germans, captured prisoners and advanced the line, sometimes by thousands of yards. They were held in high regard by other men of the lower ranks and were feared by the Germans facing them.

Who were these stealth raiders and why did they do it? What made Australian soldiers take on this independent and personal type of warfare? Using their firsthand accounts, as well as official archives and private records, Lucas Jordan pieces their stories together.

A gripping account of the crucial summer on the Western Front, Stealth Raiders: A Few Daring Men in 1918 considers the stealth raiders' war experience and training, the unprecedented conditions at the front and the morale of the German Army in 1918. Lucas Jordan argues that bush skills, and the bush ethos central to Australian civil society — with its emphasis on resourcefulness and initiative — made stealth raids a distinctively Australian phenomenon.

'Depressingly often we see books promoted as "the forgotten story" or "the untold story". Yet Stealth Raiders tells such a story, of a few daring Australian infantry who . . . so demoralised their opponents that they feared to enter the line against them' – Bill Gammage

I still haven't finished my copy, but I'm looking forward to getting back to it when I can. Copies are available from all over, but here are a few. With most you'll need to pay postage as well. Sometimes it's cheaper to purchase 3 or 4 at the same time. Your choice!



Following on from my article on the last WW1 10th. Bn. Commanding Officer, LT. COLONEL MAURICE

WILDER-NELIGAN C.M.G., D.S.O. and bar D.C.M., CROIX DE GUERRE, M.I.D. (5)

It was noted that on a lonely coastline of Talasea, on Garua Harbour, on the Northern coast of New Britain, in Papua New Guinea, overlooking the tranquil waters of the Pacific, lays an isolated grave. The grave belongs to Maurice Wilder Neligan and the inscription on that headstone reads:


IN LOVING MEMORY OF MY DEAR HUSBAND LT. COLONEL MAURICE WILDER-NELIGAN C.M.G., D.S.O. (and bar) D.C.M., CROIX DE GUERRE, WHO PASSED AWAY ON 10TH JANUARY 1923.

A gallant soldier loved and respected by all who served with him in the 9th Battalion A.I.F.

Given that next year 2023 will be the centenary of his death, I felt it would be fitting for those of us with connections to the old 10th. Battalion to do something to make sure he is not forgotten.

My previous article on Neligan will be forwarded to all members of the Regimental Council which is due to sit again in June. At that time I wrote the following "Gentlemen, with the approaching Centenary of his death in Jan 2023, we the "Regimental Council" should seek to investigate the current state/condition of Lt. Col. Maurice

Wilder Neligan's memorial. Once established, if restoration is possible we submit a request for a Govt.



In the meantime I have managed to make contact Calum Howarth, Manager Papua New Guinea, Bomana War Cemetery, Port Moresby, Office of Australian War Graves and received the following reply to my enquiry.



"Good morning Des

Thank you for your email regarding the grave of Lt. Col. Maurice Wilder Neligan in West New Brit-

ain.

You are spot on with your understanding of what has happened since I first visited the grave in 2019.

Lt Col Neligan's grave had a large tree fall on it and damage it beyond repair and the area was overgrown (refer attached images).

In 2019, the Office of Australian War Graves (OAWG) was successful in having Lt Col Neligan's grave accepted as an official Post-War grave. Consequently, my plan was to have the grave rebuilt by a local contractor, using the standard design for an official Post-War grave. The grave would then be maintained in perpetuity using a local contractor.

I was being assisted by Cheyne Benjamin, Manager of the Walindi Resort, who was instrumental in having the area around the grave cleared and who was going to assist with identifying contractors for construction and maintenance of a new grave.

Unfortunately, Covid raised its ugly head and in March 2020 I was forced to return to Australia for 16 months. Since returning to PNG in July last year and due to playing a lot of catch-up, I have been unable to return to Kimbe.

Given that next year is the centenary of Lt Col Wilder's death, I made contact with Cheyne & Cecilie Benjamin (who I've copied in) and Cecilie has confirmed that they will once again be able to assist. With Cheyne & Cecilie's assistance and support, I'm confident that we can have the grave restored and maintained to an appropriate condition.

I will of course keep you updated on progress."....

My research resulted in contacting and finally speaking to the author of "A Magnificent ANZAC", Peter Holmes in great length. He was good enough to provide contact details of a Lt. Col. Miles Farmer whose father Capt. T.E. Farmer served under Neligan during WW1 and was able to provide more details of the man.

Will wait for the powers that be to decide what we can do – perhaps a bronze plaque! Watch this space...




Running on empty is a feeling that we all have at some stage, I feel that way now as I slowly recover from a bout of covid. The ability to *bounce back* is now given the trendy title of 'resilience'. Resilience was originally an engineering term denoting the ability of an object to spring back into shape. It was later appropriated by psychologists to refer to the human capacity to recover from difficulties. It has two main elements:

- 1. recovery, which is the ability to return to normal following stress and
- 2. sustainability, which is the ability to keep going under stress.

Resilience looks at what enables people to cope when they have illness or encounter other potentially life-altering events and situations, be it in the battlefield, work place or home.

Numerous studies have concluded in high-risk populations that 'Purpose in life is a key factor associated with resilience.' Viktor Frankl, a psychiatrist and concentration camp survivor, titled the book of his experiences Man's Search for Meaning because as he states, "life holds a potential meaning under any conditions even the most mis-



erable ones." Those prisoners who lost their sense of purpose weakened and died very quickly, whereas those who retained hope along with a sense of purpose tended to survive the longest.

Purpose can come (i) internally from our thoughts, actions, life experiences and future desires or it can come (ii) externally via friends, family member or even the chain of command.

So, what's my purpose in writing this Padres Ponderings? The honest answer is to get David Laing off my back! David, in his haranguing is an external influence that has given me purpose. 04.45hrs, my bedside alarm sprang to life and I "jumped" out of bed and donned the dress of the day.. Family picked me up and got me to the gun-fire breakfast at Keswick Barracks. The weather was perfect and the eerie dawn set the scene for a very well orchestrated Dawn Service by 10/27 Battalion personnel. There were many contributors, led by the Padre. The Band played; wreaths were laid. The only thing they couldn't control were the trains ripping past the Keswick railway station. By the time the service finished, the sun had just risen like it should have (but still not recognised by the timings of some RSL services). Then it was off to the Roy Inwood VC Club for a sausage, bacon and egg breakfast with the Secretary and his daughter, a veteran.. First Class breakfast and camaraderie.

<u>08.00hrs</u>, a dash home, freshen up and pick up the Association banner. Then a quick trip into Pulteney Street to form up for the march. The waiting, while a great time to meet and greet fellow comrades and swap a few stories, is almost as hard as the march itself. This year we were at the end of group 11 and could only just hear the band (not sure which one). Our numbers were boosted to over 50, by members of the Battalion, in civvies. And while they



enjoyed the admiration of the crowd lining the route I sense by their dress and banter that their presence may have been for more than the march. My family and several others had warned me not to march....we'll provide a wheel-chair they said, take a walking stick they said, there will be ambulances along the way they said, but No, if I cant march on my own I might as well give the game away. I won't say it was easy, but the pride of leading the Association alongside our CO Sam Benveniste was more than enough and I barely stumbled once ."Six eyes rights" and I lost my voice on the last 2. Normally I would have accepted a couple of extras'" (duty officer) but those days are gone. This may have been my last march, only God knows...but I ticked the Box and was the proudest of them all. I had a few frothies at Torrens Parade Ground and got family transport home.

<u>15.00hrs</u> I was home and crashed. I awoke from a deep sleep. "Dad, Dad. Are you OK?" yelled my daughter.. I was dead to the world but satisfied. Some things never change on ANZAC Day.
